The English department at the North Campus offers students several resources to support student development of writing skills:

The English Support Center (ESC) along with the Center for Student Success offers students, whose writing skills demonstrate a need for continued instructional support, the opportunity to register for ENC 1113 as a 1 or 2-credit course. ENC 1113 reinforces the principles of composition and is individualized to meet the student's specific needs. In addition, 30-minute sessions with a lab instructor can also be arranged on a limited basis without the need to register for ENC 1113.

The English Support Center also has an electronic classroom with 30 computer workstations and audio/visual equipment allowing instructors to use the latest in educational technology to enhance students' learning experience. There is a smaller open lab area available throughout the day, which gives students the opportunity to complete webbased assignments.
