

Course Description

FSE2932 | Funeral Science Professional Review 2 | 1.00 credit

This course is for the funeral Science student who is graduating and taking the National Board Examination at the end of the semester that this course is being offered. The course is a review of the Arts section of the Funeral Science courses in order to help prepare the student for the National Board Examination. Prerequisite: Permission of the department is required

Course Competencies:

Competency 1: The student will be able to show mastery of the funeral service management subject matter by:

- 1. Identifying the four everyday tasks of management
- 2. Identifying the agencies involved in disaster preparedness and disaster management
- 3. Contrasting the several merchandise presentation styles for funeral merchandise
- 4. Interpreting businesses' financial statements to determine the business's fiscal operational state

Competency 2: The student will be able to show mastery of the funeral service counseling subject matter by:

- 1. Identifying the common sociological family types
- 2. Contrasting child and adolescent cognitive levels to grief responses
- 3. Identifying the major grief theories and their authors
- 4. Identifying the positive traits that effective counselors/communicators possess

Competency 3: The student will be able to show mastery of funeral service legal and regulatory compliance subject matter by:

- 1. Identifying the federal agencies and their regulations that affect funeral service practice
- 2. Defining the legal criteria of a 'dead human body'
- 3. Comparing responsibilities that arise out of contract and operation of law
- 4. Comparing the common property theories associated with human remains and cremated remains
