

Course Description

INT1941 | Interpreting Internship | 6.00 credits

This course includes field observation and supervised practical interpreting experience in a one-to-one or small group interpreting situation in the community. The student is assigned to an experienced, certified practicing interpreter who acts as a mentor for the duration of the internship. A minimum of 288 hours is spent in the internship experience. This includes meetings with college faculty and the interpreter/ mentor. Prerequisites: All courses in the subject major must have been completed prior to enrolling in this course.

Course Competencies:

Competency 1: The student will students with field observation and supervised practical interpreting experience in one-to-one or small group interpreting situations in the community by:

- 1. Observing professional interpreters in real-life interpreting situations, gaining insight into the role, responsibilities, and best practices of interpreters in various community settings
- 2. Participating in interpreting activities under the supervision of experienced interpreters, actively engaging in the interpretation process and applying theoretical knowledge to practical situations
- 3. Analyzing the dynamics of one-to-one or small group interpreting situations, including factors such as cultural nuances, linguistic challenges, and ethical considerations, to enhance understanding and develop effective interpreting strategies

Competency 2: The student will be experienced, certified practicing interpreter who will act as a mentor throughout the internship, providing guidance and support by:

- 1. Mentoring sessions with the assigned interpreter mentor, receiving feedback, guidance, and support to enhance interpreting skills, address challenges, and foster professional growth
- 2. Collaborating with the interpreter mentor to set learning objectives and goals for the internship, discussing progress, and seeking guidance on professional development opportunities and resources
- 3. Reflecting on the mentorship experience, analyzing the impact of mentorship on personal and professional growth, and integrating lessons learned into ongoing interpreting practice

Competency 3: Th student will have gained practical experience and improved their interpreting skills through field observation and supervised practical interpreting in one-to-one or small group situations in the community by:

- Adapting interpreting techniques and strategies to different community settings, such as medical, legal, educational, or social service environments, demonstrating versatility and flexibility in interpreting practice
- 2. Evaluating personal interpreting performance and identifying areas for improvement, utilizing feedback from supervisors, mentors, and self-assessment to enhance interpreting skills and professionalism
- 3. Demonstrating competence and professionalism in one-to-one or small group interpreting situations, effectively conveying messages accurately and impartially, and upholding ethical standards and cultural sensitivity in interpreting practice

Learning Outcomes:

- Communicate effectively using listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills
- Solve problems using critical and creative thinking and scientific reasoning
- Demonstrate knowledge of ethical thinking and its application to issues in society
