

Course Description

PLA2120C | Legal Research and Analysis | 4.00 credits

Legal Research and Analysis is an introduction to the legal system, the law library system, the ethical responsibilities and skills of a paralegal when conducting research for primary and secondary sources of law in the United States. Students must earn a minimum of a C to pass this course. Pre-requisite: Satisfactory completion of all mandated courses in reading, English and English for Academic Purposes, or ENC1101, and Pre/Co-Requisites: PLA2003 and PLA2931 with a grade of "C" or better; or departmental approval for non-Paralegal Studies majors

Course Competencies:

Competency 1: The student will develop legal research skills by:

- 1. Preparing and carrying out a legal research plan
- 2. Analyzing and categorizing key facts as well as relevant missing facts in a situation
- 3. Using both print and electronic sources of law to locate applicable statutes, administrative regulations, constitutional provisions, court cases, and other primary source materials
- 4. Using both print and electronic sources of law to locate treatises, law review articles, legal encyclopedias, and other secondary source materials that help explain the law
- 5. Properly locate and identify binding and persuasive authority

Competency 2: The student will develop the ability to conduct legal analysis by:

- 1. Analyzing which sources of law supersede other sources of law
- 2. Reading, evaluating, and analyzing both print and electronic sources of law and applying them to issues requiring legal analysis
- 3. Analyzing whether your jurisdiction accepts or permits using unpublished/ DE published opinions in legal documents

Competency 3: The student will understand the online resources available for computer-assisted legal research by:

- 1. Performing computer-assisted legal and Internet legal and factual research using free and commercial research tools (i.e., LEXIS, Westlaw)
- 2. Providing and discussing auto-cite and electronic investigation applications/resources
- 3. Accessing legal and non-legal data available on the Internet; compare keyword and subject-oriented search engines
- 4. Evaluating Internet sites for reliability and validity of information; locate and join sites that relate to the legal assistant career

- 5. Analyzing whether your jurisdiction accepts or permits using unpublished/ DE published opinions in legal documents.
