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I was saddened when Ileana-Ros Lehtinen announced that she would not be running for reelection in 2018. After all, she's been a political fixture in





South Florida since 1982 when she was first elected to the Florida House of Representatives.

She didn't stop there. She was elected to the Florida Senate in 1986, becoming the first Hispanic

woman to sit in either chamber. And when Claude Pepper died in 1989, she won a special election to fill his seat and became the first Hispanic woman elected to Congress.

In her 30 years in Congress, she was both a stalwart opponent of the spread of Communism and a progressive on social issues, most notably on matters affecting the LGBT community. She was a strong supporter of the Head Start program for the very young and to increase the availability of federal student financial aid. And on top of that, she rose to chair the House Foreign Affairs committee.

Ileana is a product of South Florida. Although her family fled the Communist Cuban regime when she was eight, she attended Southside Elementary School in Little Havana, West Miami Junior High, and Southwest High School. She has an AA from Miami-Dade, a bachelor's and master's degree from FIU, and got a doctorate in education from UM in 2004 while serving in Congress.

She may have hoped to retire to the balmy shade of South Florida, but her work is not done yet. That's why I am endorsing Ileana Ros-Lehtinen for President... of Miami-Dade College.


MDC is a serious educational institution. It deserves a serious President.

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

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
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

communities in Bogotá, Medeilín and Barranquilla that are leading the scene in Colombia.





Perhaps a bit too excitedly, the *Coming Home* crew boast that they're visiting "real" hoods in Colombia (el Centro in Bogotá, Comuna 13 in Medellín). But that's where hip hop thrives in Colombia, much like its origins in the Bronx. When they meet with Crack Family, "an infamous rap crew known for their come up in the streets," we get a sense of how the genre speaks to locals. As Cejaz Negraz explains, their entrepreneurial spirit (they sell tees, caps) is also about setting an example ("try to teach these kids that they can do something else") and moving away from a life of violence. Which is ultimately the promise and premise of hip hop.







To drive around Colombia's capital, as we see DJ EFN's crew do for much of the film, is to see street art flourishing. Graffiti, tagging, stickers; you name it, this city has it. And while the film introduces us to several graffiti writers and street artists, it also tells us the story of "Tripido," a young kid who was shot by the police when caught in the act. The media story that followed (which was complicated by the police's attempts to pin the kid as a thief), was made all crazier when Justin Bieber visited Bogotá a few weeks later and was escorted by the same police force while he graffitied the streets on their watch. Eventually, the city legalized street art, making concessions to the growing artistic community in Bogotá. There are now over 5,000 street artist active in Bogota with a legal license

Hip hop is changing lives



Despite starting their Medellín visit with a "Pablo Escobar" tour, the Coming Home crew decides to visit Casa Kolacho, a hip hop cultural center in Comuna 13. The once deadly neighborhood is currently being revitalized by several cultural initiatives, including this hip hop school which works on reforming kids by tapping into their creativity — through music and graffiti. It's but one attempt to turn their history of violence into an opportunity for growth. As Jhon Farley Ciro, who works there puts it, "We learned to sell what we do without selling who we are."



Wu Tang Clan. Tupac. Run DMC. DMX. To hear many of the MCs and rappers the Coming Home crew interview, the inspirations and influences for the hip hop scene in the South American country remain dated. But it's because they grew from them and are now interested in moving those decades-old sounds into the 21st century with local and indigenous sounds, to speak about the current trials and tribulations of a country still afflicted by the remnants of war. "So when you hear something of ours, somewhere else," as one says, "you realize it's also hip hop but it's more of our identity."

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

Screwball: MLB's Doping Dopes

It was like the World Series of criminal stupidity. Since it largely unfolded in South Florida, this scandal was fully stocked with colorful characters. There were not a lot of good guys, but arguably the worst of the worst was Alex "A-Rod" Rodriguez. Yankee fans could have told you that. The 2013 Major League Baseball doping scandal gets an irreverent but still damning



treatment in Billy Corben's *Screwball*, which opens this Friday in New York and Miami.

The most of the events in *Screwball* transpired after the Balco doping media frenzy, so nobody involved can plead ignorance. The dopers knew they were doping and the consequences they were risking. However, Tony Bosch thought he had a system that could avoid detection while still giving performance enhancing benefits through strategic mini-dosing. Rather inconveniently, the jig was almost up when his star client, Manny Ramirez, went off the regimen and tested positive. However, that perversely led an even bigger client to Bosch's doorstep: A-Rod.

Suddenly, Bosch's Biogenesis was awash in clients from the professional, college, and most disturbingly, prep levels. He even experimented with franchising Biogenesis's services through a chain of South Florida tanning salons owned by a shady pair of brothers. That was how Bosch met Porter Fischer, a tanning meathead who would become an unlikely but important witness against nearly everyone involved, through sheer dumb luck.

Screwball is a compulsively watchable, highly entertaining true crime doc, but viewers should be warned. They could get headaches from all the forehead slapping and face-palming it inspires. Sure, Corben exposes plenty of greed and corruption, but most of the time "stupidity" is the word that best defines the actions of the primary figures.

Corben has an affinity for documenting the intersection of illicit drugs and pop culture (in films like <u>Limelight</u> and <u>Square Grouper</u>), so the baseball doping scandals are a logical subject for him to explore. In this case, he makes each twist and turn clear and easy to follow. Each connection is fully established, so there really aren't any unsubstantiated claims left hanging by the time the film ends.



However, Corben makes an aesthetic choice that will be divisive (and most likely distracting), by staging his dramatic recreations with child actors, sort of making Screwball a black sheep cousin to Bugsy Malone.

It certainly distinguishes the film from the pack, but the novelty value yields drastically diminishing returns. Frankly, Corben probably would have been better off employing goofy animation instead.

Corben also needlessly alienates potential viewer by taking a cheap shot at Pres. George W. Bush, who was out of office by the time most of the events of the film took place. If you want to talk presidential politics and steroids, you could better ask why Obama's Justice Department so conspicuously let Lance Armstrong off the hook. Still, most Yankee fans will appreciate seeing A-Rod and Ramirez (a longtime Red Sox) get put under a searing microscope. One thing is for sure, the film is never boring. Recommended for bitter Yankee fans and viewers of Real Sports and the 30 for 30 series, Screwball opens this Friday (3/29) in New York at the Cinema Village and in Miami at the Tower Theater.

Looking down from a Freedom Tower window leads to a startling street scene

On my first visit to Miami, my host told me it's a good place to write. I'm glad I listened and moved here. That trip included a stop at the Freedom Tower. I recognized its architecture from a trip to Spain, where I climbed to the top of the Giralda Tower, the inspiration for Miami's landmark, and looked out over Seville to the ocean.

There's another tower on the corner of Northeast Sixth Street and Biscayne Boulevard, "The Tower of Snow," a bronze of a young boy on crutches carrying the weight of his home on his back, erected to commemorate Operation Pedro Pan and the child refugees brought to the United States at the start of the Communist revolution in Cuba. It symbolizes an immigrant's feelings of duality, fragility and exile - feelings I relate to, having grown up a military brat, in a different kind of diaspora. I'm at home in Miami, where hardly anyone seems to be from here. For the most part, Miami has welcomed me.

Most people associate the Freedom Tower with refuge and welcome, stemming from the many Cubans who were processed there when the federal government used the building as an entry point for immigrants. I now work in the Freedom Tower for the Miami Book Fair, where I write the newsletter. I'm greeted at the

elevator by a stone carving of a printing press from 1925, when the building was the headquarters of the Miami News. Periodically, the newsletter runs a column called "Freedom

As I write this, hours later, the air is cooled by thunderheads and the setting sun. While the three of us stood over the man, it felt as though we'd been trapped in a broiling oven along with a pot of evaporating water.

We called 911.

Before I moved to Miami, I worked with people with seizure disorders. I have a visceral reaction when I'm close to people in seizures. This man was having an absence seizure, which doesn't manifest with convulsion. He didn't need to be repositioned. His airway was clear. I've seen people in convulsive seizures, and feel the same distance, an electric aura, something kinetic thrown from the body, the outwardly spiraling moan of a brain with circuitry gone haywire.

It took us about four minutes to get from the seventh floor to where the man lay prone on the sidewalk and in that time, no one assisted him. Once we began to examine him closely, he became an item of interest, and a small crowd gathered. Someone looked at the man's watch to check the brand to determine if he had financial status. I'm not sure why, but my thoughts wandered to what Lorca wrote about the death of a matador, something about arsenic bells and smoke. In that instant, I felt a great loss.


After a few minutes, an ambulance arrived. The man was coming out of his haze. One of the paramedics pulled a bottle of medication from the man's pocket before they lifted him to the gurney, and said he'd be better in no time.

This reminds me how dangerous it is to be shepherded through the corral of our "urgent" agendas. How much is rendered invisible under the cool shade of our haste? Unless someone steps forward to look closely, it becomes just a paseo as always nothing to see there nothing lying fragile and frozen on the sidewalk. In the godawful heat of Sept. 1 at 2:39 p.m. in Miami, it can feel bone-chillingly frigid.

When I asked Gervacio what drew him to the window, he said he liked to look at the ocean. He'd like to sail to the Bahamas in the spring.

It's such a beautiful view from above. Sometimes, when the office is empty, and I need to clear my head to write, I go to the window and look out over the cruise ships to the white buildings on Miami Beach across the bay, and simply breathe for a minute. I am thankful I work with such a sharp-eyed man as Gervacio, who can see past the glamorous view of Miami, and notice one drop, spilled from an ocean, in danger of evaporating in the afternoon heat.

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

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


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Downtown Miami Solidifies International Destination Status

For decades, countless travelers have been flocking to Miami each year to explore its legendary see-and-be-seen beaches.

In recent years, however, the city's downtown core has been steadily developing its own momentum, growing into a stand-alone destination in its own right.

A recently completed five-year study from the Miami Downtown Development Authority found that more than six million people visit downtown annually, making it the second most visited destination in all of Miami-Dade County, behind only the beaches.

The new study, which covers 2013 through 2018, looks at development and investment in the downtown core, as well as overall hotel performance and the pipeline of hotels slated for the area. It revealed a variety of noteworthy trends:

—Hotel inventory has grown 20 percent in five years – more than 1,300 rooms have been added in downtown.

- —The data also shows that demand is keeping up with all of this supply. Occupancy rates are stable, average daily rates are up 12 percent, and revenue per average room has risen 11 percent.
- —The number of overnight stays in the urban core is up 37 percent from 2013 through 2017, growing to 2.4 million.
- —Downtown Miami doubled its number of hotels between 2000 and 2018, and that trendline is expected to continue as the neighborhood prepares to welcome 11 new hotels that are either planned or now under construction.

The new hotels now in the works for the downtown area will result in the creation of nearly 4,000 more rooms.

Development authority officials say they're also seeing a diverse set of offerings enter the market—everything from premium luxury properties like the Waldorf to limited service options like Yotel and citizenM.

So, what's fueling all of the continued confidence among developers?

In addition to the ongoing strength of hotel performance amid a growing market, developer optimism is linked to such future demand drivers as newer, larger ships slated to come to PortMiami and a new 500,000-square-foot expo center at Miami Worldcenter, according to development authority officials.

The survey's findings also coincide with a period of dynamic change in and around Miami's urban core, which is benefitting from surging population growth, new cultural and entertainment venues, the debut of retail and dining destinations, and the launch of new transit options.

"Downtown Miami's emergence as a vibrant 24/7 residential and commercial neighborhood over the past decade has been one of the country's most dramatic revitalization stories, and that growth is fueling a surge in the number of people visiting our urban core," said Miami Downtown Development Authority Executive Director Alyce Robertson.

"From world-class museums and major events to a growing number of hotels at all price points and the City's top restaurants and shopping options, Downtown Miami has earned its place as one of the world's most exciting urban destinations."

As Robertson indicated, downtown Miami has welcomed a slew of attractions and cultural offerings in recent years.

Highlights include the Perez Art Museum Miami and the Frost Science Museum in Museum Park and a retail, dining, and entertainment complex known as Brickell City Centre. Meanwhile, Miami's trendiest shops, restaurants, and bars are opening in and around downtown. Recent additions include Komodo, Casa Tua Cucina, Lost Boy, Mama Tried, Jaguar Sun and Novikov.

The Florida city also hosts a variety of major events such as Miami Art Week, the Fitbit Miami Marathon and the Miami Film Festival, all of which continue to draw visitors to downtown in droves.

Next year's Super Bowl LIV will feature an immersive village in Bayfront Park, creating a central hub for fans visiting from out of town, and the NFL has selected the InterContinental Miami as its headquarters hotel during Super Bowl week.



AN Exclusive Interview: Jharel Cotton Reflects Back On Virgin Islands, Forward On Recovery



First and foremost, a heartfelt thanks goes out to AN veteran Margie Kahn for her magical transcribing skills that made it possible for me to publish my three interviews so soon after they were conducted. I sat down with Jharel Cotton on Sunday, March 10th, to reflect on an interesting life that began in the Virgin Islands and has taken him to Tommy John surgery and, hopefully, back.

Nico: I'm really interested in learning about the Virgin Islands. I can't imagine. I've never been there and I imagine that it is just very, very different from the US. So I was hoping through you to give readers a taste of what is it like and what was it like being born there?

Cotton: Well, first of all, beautiful, crystal-clear waters, white sand beaches, coconut trees and palm trees, all those beautiful things. People are fantastic, food is amazing, culture is great. Our taste for food is amazing. A lot of tourists go down there, that's our biggest economy right now is the tourism, so we get maybe five or six cruise ships per day, sometimes, in St. Thomas.

I was originally raised in Tortola, which is British Virgin Islands, and we have some pretty cool things over there as well. As you know, the guy who owns Virgin Mobile, he lives close to the island of Virgin Gordo. I think he has his own island, and he brings a ton of people down there to his island. It's paradise. It's fantastic. Growing up there was amazing. As a kid I used to surf. I was initially a beach bum.

Nico: What do the kids do all day in summer when they're not in school?

Cotton: Some of the kids work. Most of the kids go to the beach, they fish, they jump off the bridge...mostly just go swimming, that's what they do. It's not a big, big island so we don't have that much things to do, so either we go to the beach, we go party at nighttime, or just hang out at home.

Nico: What does "party" mean? It probably means something family oriented.

Cotton: So, party like guys who are between the ages of 12 going to 18, we have a dance. So we go to a venue, there's no alcohol, it's just strictly like high school kids, and we just go out and have a big dance and meet new people, and that's about it.

Nico: I'm imaging that the lifestyle is more laid back and relaxed. America is kinda known for "go go go!"

Cotton: Yeah, it's very laid back. Like I said, it's a very small island so there's not too much going on. So all you gotta do is just chill and have a good time, go to the

beach, have a good time on Friday night at a venue, and that's it. There's not a lot going on.

Nico: And is it one of those things like everybody knows everybody?

Cotton: I would say it's over 50,000 people on the island, so it's hard to know everyone, but I would say St. Thomas is about two major high schools, four private schools, and probably like 10 elementary schools, so on and so forth, two junior high schools. So if you go to each of them, you would know everyone in school.

Nico: Would it be fair to assume that all, or many, of the 50,000 follow your career pretty closely?

Cotton: Yeah, the ones who are invested in baseball on the island, yes, they do. I have a lot of fans back there from coaches, teammates, teachers that followed me growing up most of my life. And of course I'm big in the papers down there, so if anyone reads the paper they see me and knew who I am.

Nico: How old were you when you came over to the states?

Cotton: I was 16 years old. So at the age of 16 I was playing my final summer league in St. Thomas and one of my coaches approached me, like "Hey, there's an opportunity in Virginia, do you want to take it and go for high school baseball for your senior year?" I was like "Yeah, sure. I want to go to Virginia. I feel like it's gonna be different. I'll meet a lot more people, it's a lot bigger. And plus it gets cold, so you have all four seasons, so I'll probably see snow for the first time."

So when he told me that, I was on board 100% on board. So I went to Virginia, Newport News, Virginia, at age 16, and played my final high school career there, and while I was at Virginia we won states. My first year then we won, my high school won the state tournament, so it was a milestone that you accomplished.

Nico: What was the adjustment like from Virgin Islands to Virginia? It's a little different.

Cotton: Yes, because it's a bigger place. In St. Thomas we wore school uniforms. In the states you wear whatever you want. Some of the kids would go to school in pajamas and stuff like that. So I had to get used to that.

And school times were different. School times were shorter, a lot more kids were driving to school, and it was just, I liked it, I loved it a lot. It was different and it was cool. I met a lot more people, it was a different culture, and the school loved us because we were different. We had the accent, we were from the Virgin Islands. Everyone knew we were from the Virgin Islands and they wanted to meet us and talk to us because we had pretty cool accents.

Nico: You actually don't have much of an accent now.

Cotton: I do when I talk to my family. After so long I've learned how to talk.

Nico: But with your friends do you have to actually make your accent...?

Cotton: No, actually it's normal for me now. I can talk this way and then, of course, if I talk to my family and stuff like that I (revert) to my island accent.

Nico: Interesting. So what do you miss most about the Virgin Islands, and what do you miss the least?

Cotton: What I miss most is the beautiful beaches and the sand. You can't find that in the US. The water down there is pristine, it's beautiful. What I miss least is that it's a small island so you can't do too much. I love being in a big place because I like to drive and stuff like that, I like to go to different places. Our island is 9 miles long so from end to end it's 9 miles, and the width is 2 miles. So now I live in Michigan, and for me to go from where I live to Lake Michigan is about 200 miles. So I like to drive and just relax and just check out the scenery and the trees, the outdoor species in the United States. That's what I like.

Nico: It sounds like you are an outdoor, nature person.

Cotton: Yeah, I like to see different things. Of course, Arizona has its perks too, like mountains and stuff like that, the desert. I'd love to check out Flagstaff, but I've been

to the Grand Canyon before and that was amazing for me to see. But I do complain a lot when I'm here because I'm so used to growing up seeing grass and trees, it was like a change being in Arizona.

Nico: Just turning to baseball, it's really fortunate that you were discovered because you're not huge in stature, you didn't come from a known baseball place, and then you've never really been part of a huge scouting program. So what got you on the radar?

Cotton: So this guy, name of Dan, he owns the future stars organization in St. Thomas. So as I was living in Virginia, he contacted me and was like "Hey, I have an opportunity for you to go down to Miami Dade College to do a workout." And when I went down to Miami Dade, I killed the workout. It was great. I did a great job and got a full ride to Miami Dade.

Since then, I have my sights on going to play college ball in South Miami where a lot of scouts are, stuff like that. So my first year in Miami, playing college ball, scouts would come around, and he said I wasn't big in stature but I had a good arm, and I had my changeup, so they saw those two things and they were like, well, this kid has some talent. Then I came back to Virginia that summer and pitched in a collegiate summer league, Coastal Plains League, and I dominated the league, and that year I got an offer from East Carolina. But I opted to go back to Miami Dade to finish my second year. So I went back to Miami Dade and I started throwing harder, up to 95, and then I was on the radar.

And I got drafted in the 28th round by the Mets. I didn't sign because I had my sights on going to a D-1 school to experience it. So I went to D-1, East Carolina, and I had a great year there. A lot of scouts saw me. But like you said, I wasn't showing plus numbers they wanted to see to get in the top rounds. But they gave me an opportunity, the Dodgers did, I signed with the Dodgers, and I just made my way through the minor leagues to the Dodgers. As they say, quote unquote, I was a "sleeper" in the organization because of my changeup and my fastball was pretty high when I first got drafted, so that put me on the radar.

Nico: Now, I saw you start your last start in spring training last year, and you actually pitched pretty well. I didn't know that you were probably pitching in a fair amount of pain. What was going on at that point?

Cotton: So last year, the game you saw was against the Giants. Yes, I was pitching in a lot of pain back then, but I was trying to fight through it because I didn't know what it was, and I was telling myself maybe it might be like tendinitis or something like that, so I just pitched through it and "get treatment and it will get better..."

But after that game I was, like, there's no way, I gotta get this checked out. And by getting it checked out I found out that I had a flexor strain and torn ligament. I thought I had a flexor strain but I didn't know I had a torn ligament. So when I found out the news it was heartbreaking and, of course, my season ended. So, you know, I'm coming back right now, doing great, and I'm excited to be back with the team whenever I'm ready.

Nico: Can you say a little bit more about "heartbreaking"? Because I've never been through, and I will never be through, what actually happened to you.

Cotton: Well, so I went to the doctor's office and he came into the room with the news, and he was, like, laughing a little bit — not laughing, but he was like smiling and shaking on my elbow. So I was, like, you know what, my elbow is fine, it's just probably like a strain, like I was gonna get a cortisone shot and I'd be fine next week.

So he was shaking my elbow and asking me does this hurt? I'm like no. And he was like huh, that's pretty weird, because like your ligament is torn. And I just, like, I wanted to cry. It was so bad because I've never, I've played since I was eight years old every single year, and this is the first year I didn't play at all. So just by that news it was, like, I can't play baseball for a year. It's heartbreaking. I want to play baseball and I can't because of injury.

Nico: So what was that year like? Because that's the year that nobody hears about.

Cotton: Well, that's the year I'm in the background, but I took that year to work on things I needed to work on, which is my mental strength, my body, perfecting my

mobility and my range of my body and stuff like that. And I took the year off and I did that. I stretched a lot, I got my hips together, I got my brain together, and it was a blessing in disguise. I took the year off and I learned about baseball, I learned how to become a pitcher.

Nico: I always wonder, when you get back to throwing — you've been throwing now (for a couple weeks) — what it is like mentally as far as trusting that your elbow's not gonna break?

Cotton: Well, so, when I first started my throwing program I was in a sock. I was doing sock throws. And I told myself, "My ligament is repaired, it's fine, just throw. No matter if it hurts, just throw." But you don't want to baby it, and then when you're ready to throw you do something wrong. You gotta get that out the way right now. So I had that mentality in my head and I just kept throwing, throwing. It felt great. And I just kept my mind at ease. The throwing program so far has been a breeze. I've had some nicks here and there, but I've found a way to get back into feeling good.

Nico: And what do you think is realistic as far as when, in your mind, you might be back on the big league mound?

Cotton: For me, "day by day" is the most I can say because I don't know what's gonna happen tomorrow or the next day, so I'm just taking it day by day. The time frame they said in the paper is about June, July, so of course if I hit that time frame I'll be excited. That's gonna be a goal for me to reach. So far right now I'm just taking it day by day. If I feel good today, I feel good tomorrow, then that's an A+ in my book.



Aunque el tema de la violencia con las armas fue uno de los asuntos clave en la serie de los Influyentes del año pasado —el proyecto se lanzó a raíz de la masacre en la secundaria de Parkland el 14 de febrero del 2018— la lista de respuestas de este año se concentró en la desigualdad económica, las preocupaciones sobre el medioambiente y la capacitación de la fuerza

laboral, entre otros.

"La desigualdad económica es el asunto más importante que afecta a la Florida", alegó Channer. "Le roba a nuestra comunidad el talento y la participación de una gran cantidad de ciudadanos. Nuestra capacidad de solucionar otros asuntos importantes se reduce al no poder contar con todo ese talento".

Para Arnold, mejorar las opciones de transporte público y la vivienda asequible ayudará a desarrollar las empresas en el estado.

"A medida que la diversidad de nuestra nación, estado y región sigue aumentando, debe prestarse más atención a asegurar que todos los dueños de negocios tienen la capacidad de superar los obstá-

culos para hacer crecer sus empresas. Estos obstáculos incluyen a menudo el acceso limitado al capital, a personas encargadas de tomar decisiones clave e información", dijo Arnold. "Los negocios de minorías también son afectados por asuntos clave como acceso a la educación, un sistema aceptable de transporte público y vivienda asequible'.'

Para DiBello, el asunto más importante es capitalizar el auge de la alta tecnología en la Florida creando un sistema en que los estudiantes aprendan destrezas avanzadas de manufactura.

"La Florida es un estado dinámico y rápidamente cambiante que no solamente mantiene la tendencia de una opción deseable para millones de personas que toman decisiones de estilo de vida sobre dónde vivir, sino que también emerge en calidad de una región de primera clase para compañías de tecnología de próxima generación y manufactura que buscan el entorno ideal para ubicarse y desarrollarse", dijo:

Para Eikenberg, lo más importante es evitar descargas dañinas del lago Okeechobee y evitar una inminente "crisis de agua" mediante la financiación y construcción rápida de un embalse en los Everglades.

"La Florida enfrenta una crisis de agua que pone en peligro nuestra industria del turismo, hotelería y pesca recreativa, que mueven miles de millones de dólares, y tiene un impacto negativo fuerte en los bienes raíces junto a la costa", dijo Eikenberg.

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

industria del cine que estuvieron allí. Es difícil imaginar que las estrellas de Hollywood vivan los mismos problemas y afronten los mismos conflictos que las mujeres cineastas en Latinoamérica, Centroamérica y el Caribe.

Los datos sobre la desigualdad de género en Hollywood mostrados en este documental son aplastantes y sólidos. .

Porque la lucha por los derechos de la mujer afecta a todos, tanto en la gran pantalla como fuera de ella, se escucharon los comentarios de grandes estrellas hollywoodienses como Natalie Portman, Meryl Streep, María Giese, Jessica Chastain, Reese Witherspoon, Cate Blanchett, y Lena Dunham.

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Entre las 100 películas más taquilleras de 2018, las mujeres representaron el 4 por ciento de los consejeros, el 15 por ciento de

los escritores y guionistas, el 3 por ciento de los cineastas, el 18 por ciento de los productores, otro 18 por ciento de los productores ejecutivos y el 14 por ciento de los editores. Entre las 250 películas más taquilleras de 2018, las mujeres representaban el 6 por ciento de los compositores. Esto representa un incremento del 3 por ciento desde 2017.

La cineasta brasileña Clara Linhart, quien debutó en solitario como directora con el documental *La Manuela* (2017) y presentó en el MFF la película *Domingo* (2018), codirigida con Fellipe Barbosa estrenada mundialmente en el Festival de Cine de Venecia, piensa que "fue muy fuerte como gesto político abrir el festival con esta película".

Linhart, quien lleva 20 años en la industria cinematográfica, quedó impresionada porque "es importante ver a estas estrellas norteamericanas hablar de problemas que yo vivo en primera persona como cineasta brasileña. Era difícil imaginar que ellas también pasan por eso porque parece que están por encima de nosotros, y no es así".


Jayme Gershen, cineasta y fotógrafa colombiana, residente en Miami, y una de las ganadoras de los cortometrajes hechos en Miami con *Six Degrees of Immigration*, apuntó que "fue una película que empezó una conversación. Podemos a ver un cambio en cómo nos comunicamos, funcionamos y somos en la industria".

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Vea la edición digital de el Nuevo Herald "Es importante saber que estas mujeres tan famosas han pasado por esas vicisitudes. Y aunque todas parecemos tener una vida perfecta, no saben cuánto hemos tenido que pasar para llegar donde estamos", dice tras ver el documental Anita Curbelo, directora de relaciones públicas internacionales durante más de 10 años del antiguo Festival Pobre de Cuba, actual Festival Internacional de Cine de Gibara, mánager de actores latinoamericanos y consejera en relaciones externas en múltiples festivales en Nueva York, Glasgow, Milán, Suiza y Bogotá, entre otros.

A Roxana Barba, productora del cortometraje Zenú, le sorprendió "cómo un ejecutivo tomó conciencia de su rol al empezar a implementar maneras para fomentar el apoyo a cineastas mujeres. Admitió que sintió vergüenza al recibir un estudio hecho acerca de las prácticas en su compañía que demostraba inequidad. Se dio cuenta que inconscientemente estaba negandole oportunidades a mujeres y tomó medidas para cambiarlo".

La más joven de las actrices del festival, la cubana Gabriela Ramos Gómez, de 19 años, protagonista de la película ¿Eres tú, papa?, del director cubano Rudy Riverón, tenía tan solo 16 años cuando empezó la grabación de la película en Cuba. Fue ganadora del "Seymour Cassel Award" por su excepcional actuación en el Festival Internacional de Oldenburg, entre otros, y nominada en una veintena de festivales en todo el mundo.



"Me interesa porque aporta imágenes y datos de las mujeres en la industria del cine de este país desde el pasado hasta el presente, y lo fueron abordando desde que empezó el papel de la mujer en el cine hasta hoy en día. Es importante ver cómo la mujer en el cine ha sido infravalorada, y los hombres ni pensaban que iban a ser tan buenas como son, ni que pudieran alcanzar logros por ellas mismas".

En el documental, la académica de cine Jeanine Basinger hace un repaso a la historia señalando que la situación empeoró en 1979 cuando media docena de mujeres miembros del Gremio de Directores conocido como "The Original Six"/ "Los Seis Originales" demandaron a los estudios de Hollywood por prácticas de contratación discriminatorias al descubrir que durante las tres décadas anteriores solo el 0.5 por ciento de todas las asignaciones fueron dadas a mujeres. Al final, los resultados fueron muy favorables para las mujeres.

Los datos de *This Changes Everything*, aportados en asociación con el Instituto Geena Davis sobre Género en los Medios, junto con la Unión Americana de Libertades Civiles (ACLU), indican que las mujeres representan el 50 por ciento de los espectadores y son el 51 por ciento de la población de EEUU, pero la mayoría de las películas familiares cuentan las historias de las vidas de los hombres.

"Todos mis compañeros hombres asistentes de dirección fueron promovidos a directores sin hacer un solo corto. Yo he hecho tres cortometrajes, he co-dirigido con Fellipe Barbosa, después de 10 años con él como asistente de dirección. Nadie de la televisión me ha llamado para hacer la promoción de la película", reflexiona Linhart.

"Cuando es un hombre el que manda para darte presupuesto o para darte cabida en un lugar importante, el mismo hombre duda mucho, tiene mucha inseguridad de aprobarte. Tiene que ser un hombre muy seguro de sí mismo y muy sensible al tema de las mujeres para tener esa fuerza de presentarse ante el mundo para decir que prefirió el proyecto de mujer antes que el de 20 mil hombres más", explica la directora de cine guatemalteca Verónica Riedel, quien ya está trabajado en su próximo largometraje *Gallo Gallina*.

Entre las 500 películas principales de 2018, las películas con al menos una directora emplean un mayor porcentaje de escritoras, editoras, cineastas y compositoras que las películas con directores exclusivamente masculinos, según datos del Centro para el Estudio de la Mujer en Televisión y Cine.

El 65 por ciento de todos los personajes femeninos eran blancos en las 100 mejores películas de 2018. El 21 por ciento eran negros, el 10 por ciento eran asiáticos, el 4 por ciento eran latinos y el 1 por ciento correspondía a otra raza u origen étnico.

"La situación en Brasil respecto a las mujeres es trágica y todas las feministas dicen que deben luchar por la causa de la mujer negra. Al documental le faltó tocar en profundidad la situación de las actrices afroamericanas", puntualiza Linhart.

La actriz afroamericana Tiffany Haddish recuerda de manera graciosa en el documental cómo se convenció de que ella podía hacer cualquier cosa en el cine al ver la actriz Diahann Carroll interpretar a una mujer negra rica en la serie *Dinastía*.

En el documental, la actriz y defensora Geena Davis se pregunta por qué el éxito de Thelma y Louise no hizo más por cambiar a Hollywood, al tiempo que se hace eco de las repercusiones en el movimiento MeToo y Time's Up tras estallar el escándalo de Harvey Weinstein. Destaca el abuso de poder y la absoluta necesidad de compartir el poder con igualdad entre los géneros.

Las actrices de Hollywood comparten historias de misoginia en el set. Sharon Stone recuerda cómo un director le pedía que sentará en su regazo para repasar las notas.

"He sufrido asedio y acoso, nunca una violación. Cuando eres asistente de dirección, eres el maestro de la producción, y a los técnicos les tomó mucho tiempo respetarme. Trabajar en un set de rodaje es

muy duro, 12 horas por día, seis días a la semana, de 5 p.m. a 5 a.m., y encima tener que aguantar comentarios sexistas", confiesa Clara.

"En esta industria de hombres, cuando ven una mujer sola, muy comunicativa y dispuesta a ir resolviendo todas las situaciones, muchas veces se confunden pensando que tú estás tratando de sacarlos de fiesta, en lugar de pensar que estamos trabajando", explica Curbelo, que vive entre Cuba, Colombia y Miami.

Muchas de las actrices de Hollywood se quejan de las pocas oportunidades que han tenido de colaborar con mujeres detrás de la cámara. Portman se ríe cuando dice que había trabajado solo con dos directoras, y una fue ella misma.

Kathryn Bigelow es la única mujer que ha ganado el Premio de la Academia al Mejor Director. Sólo cinco mujeres han sido nominadas: Lina Wertmüller, Jane Campion, Sofía Coppola, Bigelow y Greta Gerwig.

En el 2018, Rachel Morrison se convirtió en la primera mujer nominada para el Premio de la Academia de Cinematografía. En las 100 mejores películas del 2018, las mujeres lideraron o co-lideraron 40 películas, de las cuales 11 eran mujeres de color y otras 11 actrices femeninas de 45 años o más.

El documental muestra como la actriz hollywoodiense Reese Witherspoon pasó de ser actriz infantil a ser una poderosa productora de *Big Little Lies* y otros proyectos centrados en la mujer. Explica lo que puede ser llamado el "Efecto CSI": el hecho de presentar a la actriz Marg Helgenberger en el papel protagónico como investigadora forense ha llevado a la paridad de género en ese campo.

El estudio del Instituto Gena Davis sobre Género en los Medios también descubrió que los personales de la programación infantil son desproporcionalmente masculinos, lo que enseña que las niñas y las mujeres no ocupan la mitad del espacio del mundo. "El documental proporcionó una reflexión más amplia con respecto al contenido que consumen las niñas desde temprana edad y cómo se ven o no reflejadas en personajes del género femenino y lo que esto causa en ellas", añade Roxana Barba.

Hubo una investigación hace unos 7 años que decía que ninguna película en la que heroína fuera una mujer iba a ser taquillera. La súper heroína "Wonder Woman", dirigida por Patty Jenkins, fue el número uno y recaudó \$412.6 millones. "Emociona mucho en el documental ver imágenes de las niñas disfrazadas de este personaje. Eso es la fuerza del cine por la que tenemos que seguir luchando", muestra Linhar.

Las reacciones tras el documental son esperanzadoras. Gershen dice que a partir del MeToo empezó "a cuestionar mis experiencias y cómo quiero ser en esta industria. Aconsejo a las mujeres que lo hagan de cualquier manera. Tenemos que reflexionar en nuestras acciones diariamente por que a veces lo que la sociedad nos dice que es aceptable, no siempre es lo correcto".

EL MOVIMIENTO #METOO EN LATINOAMÉRICA

Brasil. "Este movimiento tuvo sus repercusiones, pero solo en la televisión más que en el cine. Ahora en el cine se habla más, pero no se ha perdido el miedo a perder el trabajo", explica Linhart. "En los rodajes algunos pueden pensar que todo fluye, pero para las mujeres es trabajo. En mi película como directora un actor de 70 años, el que parecía más indefenso, intentó pasarse con la asistente de maquillaje quien esperó hasta que se rodara todo para explicar lo sucedido. El dijo que fue una cosa cariñosa. El productor le dijo que los tiempos eran otros y que no se puede hacer más eso".

Cuba. "Este movimiento no está presente", explica Gabriela Ramos, quien actualmente estudia actuación en la Escuela Nacional de Arte (ENA) y trabaja como actriz en Cuba. Insiste en que no sabe si hay temas de abuso sexual o psicológico en la industria del cine o si éstos son silenciados. "Tal vez porque soy joven, no estoy vinculada a esos rumores dentro del cine. Por mi edad, no me han llegado esas referencias para no


limitarme a hacer cosas, aunque puede ser que en un futuro salgan casos en Cuba relacionados con el movimiento MeToo porque el mundo va cambiando constantemente, y hay muchas cosas que están y no se saben".

Respecto a la lucha por la paridad salarial, en Cuba "sí cobran lo mismo un actor y una actriz que tengan el mismo nivel de actuación. Se cobra poco, pero lo mismo", comenta Ramos con franqueza. "Creo que sí se subvalora mucho a la mujer. Hay más hombres directores de cine que mujeres. Teníamos una mujer directora Sara Gómez, que su obra es un punto de referencia para el cine cubano. Ya empezamos a tener más mujeres sonidistas y editoras. Y como hay más hombres, son ellos los que siempre reciben los premios. Hay que seguir luchando para incorporar a la mujer en la industria del cine cubano".

Guatemala. "Se menciona, pero la fuerza femenina es rara. Hay mucha mujer empresaria que tiene su propia empresa, pero las mujeres que escalan posiciones en las compañías no hablan de esto porque está prohibido", destaca Riedel. "No hay muchas actrices profesionales, quizás hay más en televisión".

El cine iberoamericano y los 40 años de "Alien" se apoderan de Miami



El cine en español mantiene toda su pujanza en la 36 edición del **Festival de Cine de Miami**, que proyectará a partir de este viernes 160 filmes, documentales y cortos procedentes de 40 países, y celebrará el 40 aniversario de la aterradora obra maestra "**Alien**", del británico **Ridley Scott**.

Miami se inunda de buen cine y atractivos estrenos hasta el próximo 10 de marzo y tendrá en las producciones de sello iberoamericano el "centro y corazón" del certamen, dijo hoy a Efe Jaie Laplante, director ejecutivo de la cita cinematográfica.

Retiene la gran pantalla en español, sin duda, el cetro del festival con propuestas de primer orden en diferentes categorías y la estimulante sección HBO Ibero-American Film Award lista con 22 películas que se disputarán un premio de 10.000 dólares.

"Todas nuestras películas iberoamericanas son maravillosas y queridas, entre estas la guatemalteca 'Tremors' ("Temblores"), de Jayro Bustamante, que tiene su estreno en Norteamérica y recibirá un galardón especial", señaló Laplante, que fue condecorado en 2018 con la Cruz de Caballero de la Orden de Isabel La Católica por su apoyo al cine español.

"Temblores" (2019), un filme sobre el machismo, la opresión y la misoginia, narra la historia de Pablo, que se enamora de Francisco y decide abandonar a su familia profundamente creyente y convencida de que la homosexualidad de Pablo es curable.

El cine iberoamericano toma el pulso a la realidad también con uno de los estrenos mundiales más interesantes: el hermoso largometraje "El Proyeccionista" (2019), una producción dominicano-española del cineasta José María Cabral, que compite también en la sección Knight Marimbas Award y se proyectará subtitulada en inglés el 2 de marzo.

Cabral (República Dominicana) narra en "El Proyeccionista" la historia de un hombre que pasa solo la mayor parte de su tiempo, operando un proyector en un cine, y encuentra su único consuelo en una mujer que aparece en el carrete de una película.

Un accidente destruye el proyector de cine, la única conexión de Pablo con ella, y entonces el protagonista emprende un viaje a las partes más remotas y pobres de la República Dominicana en busca de esta mujer.

La presencia femenina hispana gana también terreno en la cita con el "trabajo de mujeres increíbles" como las españolas Icíar Bollaín, Celia Rico Clavellino y Almudena Carracedo, la argentina Ana Katz, la dominicana Leticia Tonos, las mexicanas Alejandra Márquez Abella y Bani Khoshnoudi, la venezolana Carmén La Roche y la peruana Bettina Perut, resaltó Laplante.

La mujeres tienen especial peso desde el comienzo del festival de Miami, ya que este año abre el certamen el documental "This Changes Everything" (2018), del estadounidense Tom Donahue, que aborda la desigualdad de género en el cine y la televisión de EE.UU.

Consagradas actrices como Meryl Streep, Geena Davis, Cate Blanchett, Natalie Portman y Reese Witherspoon son algunas de las numerosas protagonistas de este documental que tiene su "premiere" en Florida.

En esta edición, el festival homenajea además a la actriz estadounidense Patricia Clarkson, de 59 años, ganadora del Globo de Oro a la Mejor Actriz Secundaria por su papel en "Sharp Objects", una serie de HBO realizada por Jean-Marc Vallée.

Este pulso que toma el festival a los problemas de la sociedad actual se acelera con motivo de la celebración del 40 aniversario del estreno de «Alien, el octavo pasajero» (1979), el viaje espacial más terrorífico de la ciencia-ficción.

Se trata de un "clásico que merece ser descubierto una y otra vez por cada nueva generación de fans del cine de ciencia ficción y terror", resaltó el director y comisario jefe del festival, dependiente del Miami Dade College (MDC).

Laplante se mostró fervoroso espectador de esta película que cuenta con un "increíble reparto y contribuciones indelebles de un gran equipo, incluidos los diseños de criaturas alienígenas creados por H.R. Giger", resaltó el director y comisario jefe del festival, dependiente del Miami Dade College (MDC).

En la proyección del filme, expertos "presentarán el largometraje y brindarán el contexto de su lugar en la historia" del séptimo arte.

El certamen de este año se hace eco también del éxito de las series españolas a nivel mundial, como es el caso de "La casa de papel", "Élite" y, ahora, de "Gigantes", en su "premiere" norteamericana para la noche de clausura del festival, donde se proyectarán dos capítulos subtitulados en inglés.

Dirigidos los tres primeros capítulos por Enrique Urbizu, "Gigantes" arrastra a los espectadores a un escenario de violencia y vértigo con Madrid como telón de fondo en una guerra fratricida por el control de la droga en la capital.

"Estamos entusiasmados con la expansión de nuestros horizontes con una televisión de alta calidad influenciada por el cine" que cristaliza en "Gigantes", puso de relieve.

Y puesto que "vivimos en la edad de oro de la televisión", "es natural", expresó, que el Festival de Cine de Miami "también incluya el trabajo de alta calidad que se realiza en este sector de la industria del entretenimiento audiovisual".

De esta cita cinematográfica que supera ya las tres décadas, Laplante destacó su "personalidad dinámica y multifacética, fuerte y distinta", valores que han reforzado, afirmó, su "atractivo y seguimiento durante los últimos años".

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

Juan Pablo Olyslager, actor protagonista de la cinta, y Bustamante, comparten una idea con respeto al tema: las personas que hace cine en una sociedad cerrada, **tienen el deber de señalar con el dedo las cosas con las que no están de acuerdo.**


