## eMerge Americas showcases Miami's innovation and its growth as a tech hub

During his opening remarks Monday at the annual eMerge Americas technology conference, Miami Mayor Francis Suarez left no question about his belief in the city's growth as a tech powerhouse.

"There is an attitude in Miami that has created an emergence," he said at the Miami Beach Convention Center, where one of South Florida's key tech events got underway. "You're seeing a transformation from one generation to another generation."

To emphasize that point, Suarez invited schoolchildren who were seated at the front of the crowd onstage to loud applause.

"Create the kinds of ideas and companies that will change the future for them and their children's grandchildren," the mayor said. "That's the challenge that I see before us."

Since 2014, eMerge has helped guide Miami into a bigger tech-driven future, with opportunities for entrepreneurs to pitch their ideas and more.

At this year's two-day event, whicy ends Tuesday, more than 200 companies and public entities have exhibits. Guests at the conference include: Reddit co-founder Alexis Ohanian; Serena Williams, iconic professional tennis player, venture-capital investor and Ohanian's wife; former NBA All-Star and now tech entrepreneur Baron Davis; Peter Smith, CEO of Blockchain; and entertainer Pit-bull

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

that represents the intersection of different industries and career paths. The Miami-Dade exhibit space featured an interactive walkway, two roving robots with blinking neon eyes and a female robot that can speak on command.

"We're trying to make government not just something that is approachable and reachable and attainable, but we want people to understand in our community that we're offering equitable opportunities to bridge the digital divide," Chammas said. "We were one of the founding sponsors and really believe in what eMerge Americas is

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Pedram Nimfreez is a part of Florida Atlantic University's machine perception and robotics lab. A proponent of artificial intelligence and its applications, Nimfreez is fascinated by the new technology and concepts that could be viewed on the main expofloor in the convention center. He thinks it's only a matter of time before artificial intelligence is at the center of our lives.

"Everybody's going to learn AI or work for someone that does," Nimfreez said.

Antonio Delgado, Miami Dade College vice president of innovation and tech partnership, and his colleagues were at eMerge to interact with conference attendees. That included communicating the need for tech education in a city that has quickly become awash with technologists from other places.

Delgado affirmed that residents of all backgrounds can learn new skills at Miami Dade College or earn degrees, and that he does not want to see anyone get left behind as tech gains more of a foothold in Miami.

As Miami's tech wave continues, the college announced in February it's receiving \$15 million from a quartet of public and nonprofit entities to increase its technology curriculum and make AI education available to all of its students. The investment will be used to hire as many as 15 faculty members who can satisfy surging enrollment in MDC's School of Engineering and Technology. MDC is also launching MDCTECH, a web portal designed to serve as the hub for its tech efforts.

In addition, MDC officials announced the creation of a tech-focused charter high school that will be centered at the college's Wolfson Campus in downtown Miami.

"We all see what's happening in Miami," Delgado said, noting the college "is that bridge to help anyone in Miami get a job."

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

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## eMerge Americas goes IRL with a splash, celebrates the new Miami

After a two-year hiatus, <u>eMerge Americas</u> returned to the Miami Beach Convention Center on Monday bigger than ever – and with a refreshed look, reflecting the new Miami.

Featuring over 200 speakers and with 400+ companies participating, the conference aims to offer something for everyone, whether you are an early-stage founder, an investor, a large tech company seeking talent, an educator, or one of the many supporters of South Florida's tech ecosystem. Miami Mayor Francis Suarez's vision of his city as a Crypto Capital is one of the main themes of the conference, with a number of main stage talks devoted to subjects like blockchain, NFTs and Web3.

'WE ARE STILL AT THE GOECITIES PHASE OF WEB3'

The conference kicked off with Alexis Ohanian, the Palm Beach-based co-founder of Reddit and founder of investment firm Seven Seven Six. In a wide ranging conversation with CNBC reporter Deirdre Bosa, Ohanian weighed in on web3 and South Florida as an emerging destination for innovation.

"We are still at the GeoCities phase of Web3," said Ohanian, referring to the Web 1.0 page builder and hosting service popular in the 1990s. "We're all still learning what to tinker and what to build. The builders right now have an amazing assortment of Lego bricks to build with."

While he noted that his NFT portfolio has done well over the last couple of years – its value having multiplied by some four to five times – Ohanian had words of caution for investors:

"This is a highly speculative, very, very, very early stage marketplace," he said. "There will absolutely be a churn" of products, services, platforms, and investments.

Ohanian is perhaps one of the highest-profile investors in the South Florida region, as he has invested in 36 unicorns, including Miami-based senior-tech startup Papa. Seven Seven Six now has \$750 million assets under management.

Papa's founder and CEO Andrew Parker also graced the stage with Ohanian, revealing that he is hoping to hire 100 employees in the company's Miami office in the near future. Parker hopes that Papa, now with 800 employees globally, will create an effect similar to the so-called PayPal Mafia. "I'm sure people that work at Papa will end up going to build their own companies," Parker said.

#### MIAMI A MODEL 'RISE OF THE REST' CITY

The Web3 revolution is going to take time to evolve and develop, up to a decade, and there will be shakeouts and winners and losers along the way, said Steve Case, a Web0 pioneer because AO was founded long before the Web. Still, he said, the excitement around web3 at eMerge is "intoxicating" and infectious, and that is the kind of optimism an ecosystem need to succeed. Successful startup areas bet on why the innovators will succeed rather than why they will fail, and he is seeing a lot of the former in Miami.

Case said Miami in fact a model city in the Rise of the Rest, the organization he founded to help lift venture capital attention beyond California and New York. That is because of Miami;s early believers like eMerge Americas and other community builders who didn't stop telling the story when everybody said it couldn't be done, the startups like Papa that stayed when investors said go west, and the mayors and other leaders who enthusiastically supported and trumpeted the ecosystem. While Case doesn't see Silicon Valley falling from its throne, other cities including Miami are finally getting noticed and rising up.

#### UNIVERSITIES RETHINKING THEIR MODELS

The presidents of Miami Dade College, University of Miami and Florida International University took to the main stage to talk about how they prepare students for the fast-changing world of technology. power the next revolution. The three – MDC's Madeline Pumariega, UM's Julio Frenk and FIU's Kenneth Jessell – were in agreement the traditional model of higher ed needs to change, and all three schools were actively undertaking transformation. "We must. Otherwise, we go the way of the Yellow Taxi," Pumariega said.

Pumariega talked about a personalized education experience as a platform with stackable credentials and courses that students can access as easily as they do with Netflix and other

services they use, when and where they need it. "We spent the last year reimaging the student journey," she said, and that includes connecting them with potential employers right away.

Frenk talked about "education for life," not only in providing lifelong educational opportunities – with content there when you need it — but education that prepares you for life. Universities must transform themselves, he said, adding that it is not about the traditional model of learning the theory and then applying it in internships and jobs – "It should be the other way around." Jessell added that the role of educational institutions is to help students learn how to think critically in order to navigate this fast-changing environment. Like Frenk, he said experiential learning includes internships that start in year 1, not year 4, and more of them.

#### **MEET THE STARTUPS**

The expo area of eMerge Americas was buzzing, with universities, organizations and larger companies showcasing their technology, with products and programs in elaborate booths. The LaunchPad stage featured talks with #MiamiTech leaders and founders.

But at the center of the action were some 100 startups exhibiting at their tables and some pitching on a stage in the center of the room. Let's meet a few of them.

The team from Miami-born <u>Lien Library</u> was out in full force at the conference. Their platform, a digital toolkit to identify liens on properties, is rapidly gaining clients. Most recently, the municipal governments of Miami Gardens and North Miami Beach deployed the platform, which is free for the public sector. Consumers, including investors, pay to use the platform to offset the risk of purchasing a property with a costly lien attached. "We offer an opportunity for cities to use Lien Library to earn revenue," said co-founder and CEO Mac Alabre (pictured below), since the platform makes it easier for municipalities to make good on the money owed to them through liens.



Babson grad Jason Shatsky, founder of ticket selling platform <u>TicketRev</u>, said that there is "no better place than eMerge for everything Miami Tech." The Boca-based startup has recently expanded to New York. "We've helped hundreds of fans already, and we're excited for what's to come," said Shatsky. Also in TicketRev's sights is a pre-seed raise.

Edward McGovern, police Major-turned entrepreneur, came to eMerge to showcase his public safety startup <u>Cera</u>. Last month, the rapidly-growing company provided software used by seventy security officials at the Ultra music festival. McGovern explained that the tech-powered platform came in handy in field where analog techniques are still common: "When we arrived, we saw officials using paper maps and poker chips."

Andres and Juan Barrero, co-founders of <u>LetsBox.it</u>, enjoyed the opportunity to share their unique portal that helps customers find the most cost-effective way of sending shipments overseas. Juan told *Refresh Miami* that using the platform can help customers determine the most time- and cost-saving options, as well as ensure that they avoid pitfalls like issues at customs. The Wynwood-based startup, which just raised a small angel round, currently has seven employees. Andres has spent the better part of two decades in the shipping industry.

Paddleboarding app <u>PADL</u> made waves at eMerge, touting its <u>recent growth</u>. Co-founder and COO Felipe Jauregui told *Refresh Miami* that the company has just inked a deal with the City of Miami, enabling PADL to deploy its paddleboard rental stations in a handful of new locations.

At eMerge, Learning platform <u>EducUp</u> announced that they have officially passed the threshold of one million users on the platform. Co-founders Carlos Raul and Yusnier Viera (pictured below) shared that the startup has already started raising a \$1.25M seed round.



#### **EMERGE'S MISSION**

In many ways, eMerge celebrated a very different Miami than years past, and that was evident as soon as you walked in the door. Among the largest exhibits were Blockchain.com, Algorand, Okcoin and Silicon Valley Bank. Walk in a little further and the signs are everywhere. #MiamiTech OGs remarked on how much has changed since 2019, the last eMerge Conference.

Yet, the foundational mission of eMerge Americas has not changed. Announced in 2013, eMerge launched its first conference in 2014 to connect tech entrepreneurs, angel investors, VC firms and other stakeholders with the mission of transforming Miami into the tech hub of the Americas. "This is all about building a community and building a forward-thinking innovative future for our ecosystem," eMerge President Melissa Medina said at a recent event. After all, long before Miami had tech, that was the vision of her father, a serial tech entrepreneur and eMerge's founder Manny Medina, who took the stage and was overcome with emotion. "We are on the cusp of a \$10 trillion run," said Manny Medina, referring to the digital transformation ahead, "I want Miami to be at the heart of it."

"We're a year-round platform. We connect the dots. We're tracking the data and telling the story," Melissa Medina said. eMerge is focused on continuing its mission and supporting Miami's renaissance, as well as uniting Florida in a common goal of moving tech forward in the Sunshine state. To that end it partners with Tampa-based entrepreneurship organization Synapse and VC firm Florida Funders, which is also Tampa-based but made a significant expansion into Miami in 2021.

#### PITBULL, THE MAYOR AND LIN DAI

The energy carried all the way through to the end of the day, finishing off with a conversation between Miami music legend Armando "Pitbull" Perez, Mayor Francis Suarez, and NFT platform OneOf's co-founder and CEO Lin Dai.

Ever the source of a rhyming quip about hard work and perseverance, Perez shared his excitement about the Miami tech ecosystem with a packed crowd of attendees. "What comes quick goes quicker," he said. "Me, I've always been about slow but for sho'."

Suarez shot back, describing the major growth of Miami's tech as "fast but going to last." He noted that Miami is top in the nation for tech job growth and tech migration, among a litany of non-tech superlatives including Miami being both the healthiest and happiest city in America.

Dai, who recently migrated to Miami after spending two decades in New York, highlighted that the company is spearheading various initiatives to give back to the local community as they grow here. This includes a collaboration with Perez to build a network of sports leadership and management schools in Miami and beyond.

During his talk, Dai also announced OneOf's launch of CO//SIGN, enabling early-career musicians to create a web3 version of a fan club. Artists that join the program will have a "rookie" card-style NFT. The idea is that the musicians will be provided with a long-term income stream while fans have an opportunity to prove their music prowess by identifying rising-stars at the start of their career – and perhaps even turn a profit eventually.

The day closed with Suarez's reiteration of the excitement to come for Miami, and a firm plea: "Everybody who benefits from this movement has to give back," said Suarez, citing <u>SoftBank</u> and <u>J.P. Morgan Chase</u> as examples for our tech community to follow.

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

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#### New Initiative Aims to Diversify Miami's Tech Sector

Tech Equity Miami is a collaborative effort by various groups to raise \$100 million over five years in Miami, Florida.

A campaign was announced to raise \$100 million over five years to enhance equity and inclusion in Miami's rapidly expanding technology industry.

A number of organizations, including JPMorgan Chase, the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation, The Miami Foundation, and aire ventures, recently announced Tech Equity Miami, a transformative project that will invest \$100 million over five years in the use of technology to boost equity in the city. The mission is to provide under-served communities with greater access to technology and create educational and employment prospects for youth, women, and small business owners in those areas.

The funders' consortium, which already has over \$55 million in commitments, will continue to support initiatives that lower entry hurdles into the tech business and provide underrepresented groups, such as youth and small businesses, with chances.

All projects that receive a "Tech Equity Miami" designation will contribute information and statistics to a publicly accessible database that tracks the initiative's progress toward its intended results and impact objectives. The program is targeted toward those from diverse backgrounds interested in exploring technology professions.

The initiative is focused on making sure technology can help people move up the social ladder. Stakeholders consider this a down payment on long-term investment in technology to allow people who have historically been overlooked and left behind to participate fully.

Over the next five years, Tech Equity Miami aims to provide 100,000 students in Miami-Dade County with high-speed Internet access and digital literacy. Tech Equity Miami also aims to assist 25,000 underrepresented youths and workers in obtaining tech chances. Finally, the initiative will help 1,000 small firms develop digital solutions while boosting 50,000 local families' digital abilities.

Miami's growth as a global technology center is gaining momentum, with data recently showing a 45 percent increase in venture capital funds for the metro area. According to the Brookings Institution and LinkedIn, Miami's tech sector is experiencing equally strong expansion in the number of professionals choosing to work there, with a 30 percent increase in the net flow of workers in software and IT industries who arrived last year. Similarly, enrollment in technology-related programs at Florida International University and Miami Dade College is up by double digits year over year.

The tech movement is raising issues and gaps in inequality. Although 65 percent of Miami citizens self-identify as Black or Latino, only 12 percent of the city's tech workers are Black, and 27 percent are Hispanic.

The Miami Beach Entrepreneur Center's goal is to close the gap between Miami's emerging and established technology industries. The debate over technology equity has evolved beyond employment representation, with census data indicating that as many as 100,000 Miami homes lack internet access — roughly one in five.

The public-private effort is seen as having the chance to help build an inclusive tech culture in Miami. The pandemic had a particularly devastating effect on communities of color. Now more than ever, the community is striving to ensure that equity is improved in communities of color via a variety of activities.

Miami's tech sector is now at a delicate stage of development. The city has the potential to develop and influence technology in order to represent the region's tremendous diversity and offer all Miamians access to this lucrative sector. Tech Equity Miami aims to establish a flourishing, inclusive tech community that will continue to develop businesses and wealth for decades.

Miami-Dade County and additional contributors have already aided Tech Equity Miami in raising \$55 million. JPMorgan Chase's \$30 billion national commitment to improve racial equity, announced after George Floyd's murder in May 2020 and subsequent protests against police brutality, includes financial backing for the movement.

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# Miami Dade College Students and Faculty Excel in Advancing Humanities and Undergraduate Research on the National Stage

#### Florida Governor Ron DeSantis Signs Bill to Promote Adoption

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Florida Governor Ron DeSantis signed a bill today to promote adoption and provide support for foster care parents and children. The legislation is a significant boost to abortion alternatives and helps with the kinds of financial issues that adopted plague adoption.

The measure DeSantis signed provides financial benefits for foster parents, caregivers and former foster children seeking higher education within the state.

The legislation has a \$25 million allocation, will provide a \$200 monthly subsidy to foster parents and other caregivers of preschool children to help cover child care and early learning costs. The other \$19 million will go toward increasing stipends for relatives and nonrelatives who house and raise children to the same level as those given to licensed foster parents.

"You can have lip service and talk about adoption and foster care, but are you going to actually put the money where your mouth is (and) deliver policy that is going to show that commitment is real? The signing of this bill ... should leave no doubt in the minds of anybody in the state of Florida that this state stands committed to the proposition that every life counts," DeSantis said.

The pro-life governor added: "All these kids deserve an opportunity, and we're going to do what we can to make sure their dreams and hopes and aspirations can become a reality in a loving home."

DeSantis signed the measure at Miami Dade College's Wolfson Campus in front of families and supporters of the bill.

"Through this funding, more than 7,000 foster parents and caregivers will receive this subsidy for the children that are in their care. And that's going to make a big difference. Quite frankly, just from a feasibility perspective, foster parents have to work to put food on the table like anyone else. This will help them in that regard," the governor said.

It was my first experience in college and I always say it was the foundation to my success" said **Demarco Mott,**Former Foster Youth. "I am now serving on the board of directors of Educate Tomorrow. We hear the stories, we get the calls and we needed this. It is definitely exciting to know that we can do a lot more. Policy makers are listening and providing more money and now we can go ahead and do more good work. When we can invest in our children now, we get that reward in our society later."

"Across our state, we have so many dedicated relatives who are willing to step up to the plate and take on the responsibility of raising a child. Whether it is the level of monthly support needed to feed, clothe and shelter a child, or access to the college tuition waiver, these heroic family members should have the same level of benefit as a foster family," said Senator Ileana Garcia. "Likewise, the costs of out-of-home daycare, which we require for children in the dependency system, have been identified as a major barrier for families interested in fostering children. This bill closes the gap between what the Early Learning Coalition voucher pays and the actual cost of care. I am so grateful to our Governor and First Lady for their work to support the courageous families who provide safe homes when a vulnerable child is in need."

The bill amends section 39.5085, Florida Statutes, by providing an increase in monthly payment for relative and nonrelative caregivers to be equal to the room and board rate for a licensed foster home. This change is important because often, placing children with relatives or family friends is the best outcome to ensure their future success.

Previously, relative and nonrelative caregivers received \$250-\$320 less per month than licensed foster homes.

Additionally, the bill creates a \$200 per month child-care subsidy for any foster parent and relative or nonrelative who has a child between the age of birth to school entry placed in their home. This program will ensure every foster child has access to early learning programs and will help foster parents afford to enroll these children in child care.

The bill also amends section 1009.25, Florida Statutes, to reorganize and expand the population of students eligible for the tuition and fee waiver for children who have interacted with the dependency system. The program provides for exemptions from the payment of tuition and fees at workforce education programs, Florida College universities. System institutions or state Previously, exemptions were limited to children who were in foster care as they turned 18. Now, tuition and fee waivers will be available for children who were adopted out of the foster care system or spent a significant time in foster care in their teenage years.

Today's announcement follows the signing of HB 7065, which provided groundbreaking support for involved fatherhood in Florida. Read more about HB 7065 here.

# M-DCPS Superintendent Visits Homestead


Thursday, March 31, 2022 was definitely a busy day for Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) Superintendent Dr. Jose L. Dotres who managed five back-to-back "Meet and Greet" sessions that began in Pinecrest.

District 9 School Board Member Luisa Santos planned the tour with the respective municipalities with the Homestead/Florida City stop at the Seminole Theatre.

Civic, business, and community leaders joined educators to have what was for many the first opportunity to hear from the man selected to head the fourth largest public school system in the country.

The South Dade Chamber of Commerce helped sponsor the event as the Homestead Senior High School Band played rousing music on stage and cheerleaders in the aisle greeted attendees moving from the lobby into the theatre.

"This indicates a new focus on Homestead as the place to be with what is happening here and in Deep South Dade,"

Homestead Mayor Steven Losner said as part of his brief welcoming remarks.

"Three things make a city great; great schools, affordable housing, and public safety," Vice Mayor Julio Guzman included after thanking Santos for arranging the tour.

"As an educator

myself, I know the next few years are going to be critical," Councilmember Jenifer Bailey commented, and highlighted special issues like infrastructure gaps, digital divides, and parents who often struggle for advocacy for their children. She acknowledged community organizations such as MUJER and En Familia, who work extensively with families.

Councilmember Erica Avila mentioned the Kiwanis International Student Service Leadership Programs (SLPs) which have programs from elementary school through high school and into college.

In a later discussion, Councilmember Larry Roth spoke to community non-profit efforts providing food to students to supplement shortages at home. This is a concern he will pass on to the District Office.

"I know how far we've come with our highest graduation rate ever of greater than ninety percent and the most school choice programs," were among District 9 School Board Member Santos remarks as she cited progress still needed with challenges like housing insecurity. She emphasized the importance of the involvement of cities, businesses, and nonprofits in support of schools.

"With your partnership, growth is what is See SCHOOLS 2A

going to happen with all of you at the table." Her formal introduction of Dr. Dotres included pride in being one of the individuals who brought him back to Miami-Dade.

As the M-DCPS website shows in part, "At the age of five, he arrived in Miami, Florida – an immigrant boy from humble beginnings who enrolled in M-DCPS as an English Language Learner, graduated from high school, and began a long and rewarding career serving students, parents, employees, and the larger school community within the system that welcomed him as a child. Having held multiple instructional and administrative leadership roles over the course of his career in M-DCPS and other educational organizations, Dr. Dotres is a proven educator with a wealth of experience. He has served in the capacity of Teacher, Reading Coach, Principal, District Administrator, Regional Administrative Director, Region Superintendent, Assistant

Superintendent, Chief Academic Officer of Broward County Public Schools, Chief of Staff, Chief Human Capital Officer, and most recently, Deputy Superintendent of Collier County Public Schools."

Early in his comments, the Superintendent said he was recently reminded of the phrase, "We have two ears and one mouth," and he is listening to communities to gain a better understanding of the areas he's not familiar with. He recounted how what was then Miami Dade Community College turned his life around with respect to academics. Even so, his initial career started at American Express, although he always knew he wanted to teach. His point was that our teachers come from different sources. In asking various groups in the audience to stand, he said, "Principals are the ones who truly create the optimal environment for students to learn."

A primary theme was M-DCPS has, "ventured into a


new landscape", and there must be balance between academics and social and emotional support. Effects of COVID have been felt by everyone and resources are being added to bridge the gap of "unfinished learning".

One measure taken was the recent Spring Academy where many teachers voluntarily gave up their Spring Break to hold extra classes for designated students. Early literacy intervention is especially important because Kindergarten as well as first and second graders didn't receive the traditional level of instruction due to COVID disruptions.

On a note about older students, post-secondary education must include paths to good-paying jobs in technical and trades fields. These options enable graduates to go immediately to work with sustainable salaries and college can come later if they so choose.

Projecting the excellence of our schools is another goal, "We want our schools to be the parents' choice and to be the





employer of choice."

With 41,000-plus employees, there are multiple roles for other than teachers. Under-

standing and attending to migrant children needs is something else he addressed as was special learning. In his experience, excellence in every student sometimes requires new approaches to bring out their potential.

After a standing ovation, he had time for a few questions and said his staff was taking notes to provide responses later. When asked about arts in school, his immediate reply was arts are critically important to balance with academics. MDCPS is committed to keeping arts programs alive and expanding them.

### Florida jobless rate dips to 3.2 percent

Florida's unemployment rate dipped to 3.2 percent in March, as workers shift away from gigs at hotels, restaurants and entertainment venues for higher-paying jobs in manufacturing, warehousing and logistics. The Florida Department of Economic Opportunity released a report Friday that said the March jobless rate was down from 3.3 percent in February. - > Florida Keys celebrate 40th anniversary of Conch Republic [Tampa Bay Times]
  The 40th anniversary celebration of the Florida Keys' symbolic secession from the United States, motivated by a 1982 U.S. Border Patrol checkpoint established on the only road connecting the Keys with mainland Florida, has begun in Key West. The 10-day Conch Republic Independence Celebration kicked off Friday with a waterfront ceremony at the island city's Mallory Square.
- As inflation numbers hit a 40-year high across the nation, rental rates for industrial and warehouse spaces were climbing faster in the Orlando metro area than other parts of the country. Tom Whisner, who owns Apogee Productions in Longwood, said the pandemic crippled his concert and event business. "We had ramped up to where our big thing was doing touring and arena shows. That is what they just totally cut," he said.
- The Florida Department of Education on Friday said the state will not include dozens of math textbooks in a list used by school districts to buy books for classrooms because their content included references to critical race theory and other "prohibited topics" and "unsolicited strategies." 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O'Brien braids together previously unknown stories of Hooker Chemical's deeds; the local newspaperman, scientist, and congressional staffer who tried to help; the city and state officials who didn't; and the heroic women who stood up to corporate and governmental indifference to save their families and their children. They would take their fight all the way to the top, winning support from the EPA, the White House, and even President Jimmy Carter. By the time it was over, they would capture America's imagination.

Sweeping and electrifying. *Paradise Falls* brings to life a defining story from our past, laying bare the dauntless efforts of a few women who — years before Erin Brockovich took up the mantle — fought to rescue their community and their lives from the effects of corporate pollution and laid the foundation for the modern environmental movement as we know it today.

"My dad is, obviously, in the field, so from a young age I've always seen him in the field. I just love being on camera. I love talking. That's something I inherited from my dad, because he's the same way. My dad loves attention the same way I do," said Zabala.

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

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
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# La corrección política atenta contra la incómoda Jezabel

La primera vez que Hernán Jabes leyó *Jezabel*, la cuarta novela de Eduardo Sánchez Rugeles, fue en 2015. Lo hizo en una sola sentada. Y quedó impactado. La historia le gustó tanto que de inmediato pensó en hacer una adaptación cinematográfica. Se dio a la tarea de buscar al autor para proponerle la aventura, quien, sin dudarlo, aceptó. Así comenzó el recorrido del largometraje que explora los conflictos morales de cuatro jóvenes caraqueños.

Jezabel – que forma parte de la colección de novela negra Vértigo, del sello Ediciones B – narra un crimen atroz, el asesinato de la joven Eliana Bloom, cuyo cadáver fue hallado en su apartamento en Caracas con indicios de maltrato físico y violencia sexual. La novela reconstruye los hechos a través de los recuerdos de Alain, uno de los mejores amigos de la víctima. En el proceso, debió enfrentarse a los engaños de su propia memoria para esconder una dolorosa realidad.

«Una de las cosas que me llamó la atención del libro no fue solo su irreverencia y lenguaje descarado, sino la analogía que hace a la sociedad, que no es sólo la venezolana. Entonces, creo que la película se logró en el sentido de que tiene una historia universal», dice el director Hernán Jabes desde México, donde reside desde 2016.

Para la adaptación de Jezabel, Jabes y Sánchez Rugeles comenzaron a trabajar de inmediato en el guion de la película. Debido a la distancia, el autor residía en Madrid mientras y el director aún estaba en Caracas, trabajaban a través de Skype. Se reunían dos veces por semana en sesiones de tres horas, en las que las fallas de audio o imagen siempre estuvieron presentes. Sin embargo, recuerdan esa etapa como una experiencia constructiva, sana, amable y divertida.

«La estructura del guion fue muy fluida, muy cómoda, creo que fue una colaboración muy correcta. Quedamos muy conformes con el trabajo», asegura Sánchez Rugeles.



Aunque no se conocían, conectaron de inmediato, cuenta Jabes. En el proceso de escritura no tuvieron mayores diferencias. Compartían la misma visión de la historia. «Para mí era importante mantener la esencia y a los personajes», afirma el cineasta, quien agrega que Sánchez Rugeles le dio todas las licencias para realizar la adaptación.

Jezabel es la segunda adaptación cinematográfica de una obra de Eduardo Sánchez Rugeles. La primera fue *Dirección opuesta*, de Alejandro Bellame. Por esto, los cambios en la película no le generaban preocupación, todo lo contrario. «A diferencia de la literatura, el cine es absolutamente colaborativo y eso le viene muy bien a la historia. Si algo necesita el cine es que confíes en el otro. Sé que el guion es simplemente una pieza; no soy purista con el guion, sé que es algo que está para ser modificado. La belleza de esa confianza la tomo como algo positivo y para nada me incomoda. Incluso, cuando los actores improvisan sobre mi texto me encanta», asegura.

El primer acercamiento de Sánchez Rugeles a la escritura de guiones para cine fue con *Dirección opuesta*. De esa experiencia obtuvo un gran aprendizaje que le fue útil para la adaptación de *Jezabel*. «Fue un curso, una maestría en escritura de guiones. Yo nunca antes había escrito un guion. Tenía alguna idea de cómo era el formato, pero desconocía en gran medida lo que era la estructura del guion de un proyecto audiovisual. Entonces, trabajando con Alejandro Bellame para *Dirección opuesta* aprendí muchas cosas, comencé a entender y a percibir esa diferencia entre la acción audiovisual y el relato narrativo, que a veces no funciona para cine. Sin duda, a *Jezabel* llegué con más madurez y aprendizaje para escribir guiones», recuerda el autor.

A Sánchez Rugeles le resultó extraño revisitar obras que había escrito hace un tiempo. «Me genera una sensación de resquemor, de si me encuentro o no, me reconozco o no. En el caso de *Dirección* 

opuesta y Jezabel fue esencial que ya hubiese olvidado esos textos. Me pasó, no tanto con Jezabel pero sí con Dirección opuesta, al ser mi primera novela, que cuando la leí encontré cosas que no me gustaban. Con Jezabel siento que, a nivel de estructura, forma y lenguaje, es una novela más madura, por lo que no hubo tanto choque, sino que las cosas que se excluyeron o modificaron fueron para que se adaptaran con comodidad al relato audiovisual», cuenta.

Terminar el guion de *Jezabel* les tomó año y medio, aproximadamente. El rodaje comenzó en 2018, se hizo entre Caracas y Ciudad de México. El largometraje se narra en dos tiempos, pasado y presente, por lo que se filmó en dos partes. Primero la etapa de los recuerdos, la adolescente; después la etapa adulta de los personajes. «Paramos por unos cinco meses por varias razones: para que el actor tuviera un cambio físico y psicológico y, al ser una película independiente, nos habíamos quedado sin dinero y necesitábamos buscar los recursos para continuar», cuenta Jabes.

El casting está conformado por Gabriel Agüero como Alain Barral, Eliane Chipia es Eliana Bloom, Johanna Juliethe interpreta a Loló, Shakti Maal da vida a Cacá y Erich Wildpred es Salvador. También actúa César Augusto Cova como Flema, Armando Cabrera como el padre de Loló, una pequeña aparición de María Conchita Alonso como la madre de Alain, Héctor Manrique como el profesor Rafael y Diana Volpe interpreta a Alfonsina Mathinson.

La selección del casting estuvo a cargo de Hernán Jabes y Adrián Geyer, productor del filme. Contactaron a actores que querían en la película. Aunque no participó en esta selección, Eduardo Sánchez Rugeles sugirió el nombre de Eliane Chipia. «Una de las cosas que más me gusta de *Jezabel* es el trabajo actoral. Estoy muy conforme con el trabajo que se hizo y el talento de los actores es una de las cosas con las que más me siento cómodo», dice.

Para Gabriel Agüero, formado en el teatro, cofundador de la agrupación Deus Ex Machina, que ha participado en películas como *Fabulación* (2017) o *El baile* (2019), fue un reto interpretar a un mismo personaje en dos líneas de tiempo, debido al cambio físico y psicológico que requería. «Para mí era muy claro que tenía que abordar el trabajo olvidando lo que había pasado en la primera etapa del rodaje. De hecho, no quise ver ningún material para tener una sensación de olvido, de recuerdos confusos, de memoria selectiva», cuenta.

Y agrega: «Esa parte se enfoca, precisamente, en cómo una persona se enfrenta a sus recuerdos, tormentos del pasado, de una etapa confusa, conflictiva, rota y llena de contradicciones».

Al igual que Agüero, para Eliane Chipia interpretar a Eliana Bloom fue un reto. La actriz se enfrentó a una situación similar a la de su personaje, no de la misma forma ni magnitud, afortunadamente. Aunque tenía la carga emocional para interpretar al personaje, estaba en un momento distinto, en el que no se identificaba como víctima sino como justiciera. Esto hizo que le fuera un poco complicado empatizar. «Al final, fue hermoso porque revivir esa mala experiencia me hizo, de alguna manera, hacer catarsis y sanar», afirma.

«Sin duda, el reto mayor, en lo personal, fue revivir un toda esa situación porque yo la había bloqueado. Fue como 'esto ya lo viví, lo tengo claro', pero abrir la puerta nuevamente a la herida no es sencillo. Muchas veces te van a decir que no es necesario que hagas eso porque hay un montón de técnicas que puedes abordar para no tocarte personalmente, pero si uno como intérprete no empatiza de manera genuina, se va a notar. Una maestra siempre me decía que le puedes mentir a todos, menos a la cámara», añade Chipia.

Esta no es la primera película en la que participa la actriz. Chipia ha actuado en cintas como El Silbón (2018) y *El desertor* (2015), su debut y por la que recibió una mención especial como Actriz Principal en la edición de 2015 del Festival de Cine Venezolano de Mérida.

Durante el rodaje una de las preocupaciones de los actores era poder recrear la complicidad entre los cuatro amigos, pues no todos se conocían. Por eso, tuvieron la oportunidad de pasar tiempo juntos antes de comenzar a trabajar para conocerse mejor. «Hernán tuvo la genial idea de que cuando llegáramos a Venezuela teníamos que estar juntos todo el tiempo. Entonces, cuando íbamos a las visitas de locaciones, que un actor no tiene que ir, estábamos juntos. No teníamos nada que hacer más que estar juntos y conocernos, eso terminó en una complicidad muy grande», recuerda Agüero.

*Jezabel* es una película que retrata a un grupo de jóvenes de familias acomodadas poco atendidos por sus padres, que carecen de principios y que viven una libertad sin límites, contenida por el contexto sociopolítico en el que viven. Aunque es complicado decir que los jóvenes de cualquier generación pueden identificarse con la historia, Eduardo Sánchez Rugeles considera que no resulta indiferente. «Tengo la sensación, sobre todo con la película, de que te puede gustar o no, pero no resulta indiferente. Las personas después de verla quedan sorprendidas y eso me parece fascinante. Ese impacto lo valoro como un mérito de la película».

El filme se ha presentado en el Miami Film Festival y en el Festival de Málaga. En ambos la receptividad fue buena, cuenta Jabes. Sin embargo, debido a la crudeza de Jezabel ha sido difícil que los distribuidores se interesen por el filme, señala el director. «Desde un poco antes de la pandemia surgió una corrección política de cómo tratar las cosas y qué decir y qué no. La verdad, cuando hicimos la película jamás pensamos en eso y a medida que iba pasando el tiempo nos encontramos con esta nueva realidad comunicativa que atenta contra el filme», explica.

«Es una película oscura, pero creo que en un mundo tan encandilado por la luz de las apariencias y de la corrección política, la oscuridad de la película que presentamos despierta una chispa mínima y en cualquier oscuridad la chispa más mínima ilumina. Esa es la intención de Jezabel», agrega Jabes.

Tanto Jabes como Sánchez Rugeles coinciden en que Jezabel, la novela y la adaptación, es una obra que, pese a su historia local, tiene un lenguaje universal. «Nunca la escribí o la pensé con esa mirada localista, que solo estuviese limitada al territorio venezolana. Siempre tengo la universalidad como premisa y son historias de amor, desamor, familia, amistad, violencia, el bien y el mal. Esos son los temas que yo trabajo en mis historias y que creo que son temas universales», afirma el autor.

Aunque *Jezabel* tendrá su estreno europeo en Festival Internacional de Cine de Barcelona donde se presentará el 23, 25 y 27 de abril con sesiones abiertas al público –siendo la única película latinoamericana en competencia oficial–, aún no tiene no tiene un recorrido definido. Sigue buscando espacios para presentarse. El filme es una coproducción independiente entre México y Venezuela. Su distribución en Europa estará a cargo de Latido Films.»Creo que es fundamental que la gente vea la película, aunque incomode o haga sentir mal por todos los temas que plantea», asegura Jabes.

Se desconoce la fecha de estreno o si llegará a los cines venezolanos. «No veo por qué no podría llegar a los cines en Venezuela. Tengo una vocecita en mi cabeza que me dice 'A lo mejor no me la

van a aceptar', pero por otro lado me cuestiono y me digo 'Pero ¿por qué?, si al final de cuentas es una película, es ficción», indica el cineasta.

Pese a las dificultades, Hernán Jabes asegura que siempre se ha decantado por hacer cine que mueva al espectador. Desde *Macuro*, *Piedra papel o tijera* y, ahora, *Jezabel*. «Además de entretener, hacer reír o llorar, quiero hacer películas con las que las personas se sientan diferentes, que las hagan cuestionarse cosas. Ese es el cine que me interesa, que entretenga, pero que también mueva fibras», finaliza.

# De la mano del cubano Andy Rodríguez Miami Dade College se corona en su conferencia.

Con excelente pitcheo del habanero Andy Rodríguez y aporte ofensivo del spirituano Loidel Rodríguez, los Tiburones del Miami Dade College, se proclamaron campeones en su conferencia de la División NJCAA del béisbol colegial estadounidense.

Aunque faltan algunas fechas por disputar matemáticamente los chicos de Miami ya son inalcanzables en la tabla de posiciones. Hoy lo ratificaron con victoria 2×1 a los Pioneros de Indian River. Miami Dade tiene récord de 32-13.

Andy Rodríguez estuvo haciendo su salida más larga desde que está en Estados Unidos. Pues hoy lanzó ocho entradas completas con solo 3 hits y 8 ponches. Con un total de 100 pitcheos (67 strikes). Hoy su recta estuvo oscilando entre las 90-92 millas por hora y tocó esporádicamente las 93.

En toda la campaña Andy Rodríguez tiene récord de siete victorias con solo dos derrotas. Ha trabajado un total de 66 innings con 81 ponches y ha regalado solo 14 boletos en ese lapso. Su efectividad ahora descendió hasta 2.86 y le batean para .203 sus rivales.

También representando a La Mayor de Las Antillas estaba el receptor de Santi Spíritus Loidel Rodríguez. Loidel bateó en el juego de hoy de 3-2 con un doble. Para contribuir con el madero al triunfo de su equipo.

El máscara ahora batea para .317 gracias a sus 46 indiscutibles en 145 visitas al home plate con 15 dobles, un triple y tres batazos de vuelta completa, como extrabases en el campeonato. Además, con sus 38 carreras anotadas y 38 remolques, suma un total de 73 carreras producidas. Para fijar línea ofensiva de .434 OBP, 497 SLG y 931 OPS.

Los Rodríguez estuvieron saliendo de Cuba en el 2021, el capitalino en el Preolímpico de Las Américas disputado en la Florida y el de la tierra del Yayabo en el Mundial Sub-23 de México.

Ambos jugadores, aunque son jóvenes tienen su nivel muy por encima de la media de esta categoría. Pero al mismo tiempo es necesario para ellos para poder adaptarse lo más rápido posible al béisbol organizado y dar el salto al profesionalismo sin carencias en el A, B, C del juego.



**MIAMI.-** Una niña es la protagonista del reciente <u>libro</u> de José Ignacio Valenzuela, reconocido autor chileno residente en Miami. La <u>novela Mona Carmona y el enigma de la Sagrada Familia</u>, dedicada a lectores jóvenes, se presenta el sábado 23 de abril a las 4:00 p.m. en el Koubek Center, en conjunto con la Feria del Libro de Miami, el Grupo Editorial Planeta y la Fundación Cuatrogatos.

"Un hombre ha muerto y con eso ha cambiado el destino de su ciudad. Se ha ido Francesc Carmona, el último ser humano capaz de contar la verdad sobre la Sagrada Familia, ese orgullo de Barcelona que lleva más de cien años en construcción. Ahora solo quedan la especulación y la leyenda. A menos que Ramona Carmona logre demostrar que su abuelo no se llevó ningún secreto a la tumba, que la verdad está ahí, esperando que alguien tenga la capacidad —y la audacia— de revelarla", plantea la sinopsis del libro, editado por Destino, sello de la Editorial Planeta.

Durante el evento de este 23 de abril, cuya entrada es gratuita, Valenzuela charlará sobre su novela con Betty Quintero, promotora de lectura y licenciada en Letras de la Universidad Central de Venezuela.

Quintero, colaboradora de la Fundación Cuatrogatos, señaló que "este libro te toma por asalto desde el primer capítulo y te atrapa hasta el final. El suspenso y la aventura enganchan por igual a jóvenes y adultos en un viaje sin retorno".

"Mona Carmona está destinada a ser un referente en la literatura juvenil, y a ganarse un espacio en las bibliotecas familiares", agregó.

Por su parte, Antonio Orlando Rodríguez, escritor, cofundador de la Fundación Cuatrogatos, subrayó que "ninguna forma mejor de celebrar el 23 de abril, Día Internacional del Libro y del Idioma Español, que presentando una nueva obra de un destacado autor que vive y escribe en Miami".

Sobre el encuentro con el autor, en los jardines del Koubek Center, dijo que "va a ser un rato distendido, en el que se conversará sobre literatura, sobre las historias policíacas y sobre el trabajo de un creador que ha dado pruebas de su capacidad para cautivar al público tanto con sus libros como con sus series de televisión".

Esta novela detectivesca para jóvenes da inicio a una nueva serie de libros de José Ignacio Valenzuela (conocido como "Chascas"), quien ha publicado anteriormente numerosas obras literarias para adultos y para niños, entre ellas *El filo de tu piel, La mujer infinita, Trilogía del Malamor, Hashtag y Mi abuela la loca.* Con su libro *Conoce a Mario Moreno "Cantinflas"*, este destacado escritor ganó el Premio Campoy-Ada otorgado en el 2021 por la Academia Norteamericana de la Lengua Española (ANLE).

El autor es ampliamente conocido, también, por su trabajo como guionista de exitosas series de televisión, entre ellas ¿Quién mató a Sara?, cuya tercera temporada se estrenará próximamente.

#### Reflexiones en torno a la creación literaria

Gracias a la gestión de Antonio Orlando Rodríguez y Sergio Andricaín, creadores de la Fundación Cuatrogatos, José Ignacio Valenzuela se refirió a varias cuestiones sobre literatura. Valenzuela ha publicado numerosos libros para adultos y para niños y para jóvenes, entre estos últimos varias novelas detectivescas juveniles. Es autor de exitosas series de televisión, entre ellas ¿Quién mató a Sara?, transmitida por Netflix, que ha alcanzado una gran audiencia internacional. El escritor descubrió las novelas detectivescas cuando le regalaron un libro por su cumpleaños número 12: Muerte en las nubes, de Agatha Christie.

#### Lecturas de adolescencia

Pienso que la adolescencia es el momento perfecto para leer novelas detectivescas porque en esa etapa de la vida uno tiene más preguntas que respuestas. Entonces, encontrar un libro que de alguna manera satisfaga tu ansia de respuestas, después de muchos vericuetos, es muy satisfactorio cuando tienes 15 o 16 años. Quizás por eso históricamente la literatura policial, que en sus inicios nunca fue creada con los lectores juveniles en mente, fue adoptada por ese público.

#### Retos

Los jóvenes de hoy día son profundamente distintos al joven que yo fui y cuando estoy produciendo un libro con la calidad literaria que quiero que tenga, no puedo olvidar que estoy compitiendo con otros productos, tanto literarios como audiovisuales, que van a pelear por ese espacio que aspira a ganarse mi obra.

Por eso trato de dotar a mis libros de un vértigo, de una estructura que sea de fácil decodificación para los jóvenes y que, por lo general, sea más audiovisual que literario, con giros inesperados al final de cada capítulo. Trato de construir un contenido que sea no solo atractivo de leer, sino también de imaginar.

¿Por qué una novela con una adolescente como investigadora?

Partió del hecho de sentir que había una desigualdad de género bestial que no me gustaba. Siempre he sido muy promujer y me parecía gravísimo que todos los héroes fueran masculinos. Esto se cruzó con el hecho de que fui papá de una niña. Eso me llevó a pensar más cómo, desde mi pequeñita trinchera, podía contribuir a la equidad de género.

Entonces decidí crear el personaje de Mona Carmona, una chica detective, con la idea de que en el futuro mi hija pudiera sentirse orgullosa de ese personaje. Por eso la novela está dedicada a ella, porque fue como el primer regalo que le hice para decirle: "Si quieres ser una heroína, investigar enigmas, saltar paredes, subir a las torres de la Sagrada Familia a medianoche y atrapar criminales, aquí hay alguien a quien admirar".

¿Quién es Mona Carmona?

Ramona Carmona tiene 13 años recién cumplidos, es huérfana de madre, vive con su padre en México y tiene una relación conflictiva con su familia.

La muerte de su abuelo catalán hace que Mona y su padre tengan que viajar a Barcelona. Allí, Mona se topa con un diario de vida de su abuelo y descubre que este escondía una cantidad enorme de secretos.

Relación entre sus historias audiovisuales y sus libros policíacos

Cuando escribo una novela detectivesca, los elementos son los mismos que utilizo en un producto audiovisual. No hay mucha diferencia para mí, porque siento que apelan a lo mismo: mantener cautiva a tu audiencia, atraparla, lanzarle un gran anzuelo y mantener su atención.
